	At the events, UCAS intend to have a prominent Q&A Support Zone, encouraging attendees to focus more on the Q&A aspect of an event.
	UCAS are looking to introduce the use of Mission Cards with questions for attendees to ask at event.
	Between 2011-2020, there was a 450% increase in the number of UK applicants sharing mental health conditions on their UCAS application.
	There are additional challenges for students with disabilities or who are care-experienced when attending an event. Exhibitors should ensure that staff are prepared to answer the types of questions that these students require the answer to at events e.g. student support services. UCAS reports on these areas are available.
	UCAS have forecast 1 million applicants in 2026. There will be greater demand for university places and additional challenges for WP applicants.
	With the introduction of additional questions within the UCAS application to support widening access, it is likely that these applicants will be prompted to ask questions about student support at a UCAS event.
Case Studies/Examples:	
Scenarios/Roundtable discussions:	If UCAS could do one thing to help disadvantaged or unrepresented students get the most from events, what should we do? Suggestions from discussion UCAS could provide preparation resources to HEIs to help deliver to schools in advance of attendance at an event. Change the teachers' lounge to a teacher workshop area. UCAS could simplify the event registration process by merging it with the application system. This would allow attendees to identify themselves as WP students. Not all teachers are receiving UCAS materials and updates regarding their local event due to changes in staffing. UCAS to ensure that their mailing lists



	are up to date before sending out materials and mailings. Introduction of an I Don't Know area at events. Make use of student ambassadors to speak to attendees instead of picking up cardboard. Please send any further ideas to access@ucas.ac.uk
