# Option 1: Keep on Movin' - Elliot Newstead - Associate Director of Future Students at De Montfort University. [ONLINE]

On average, people spend \*roughly\* four years in a job but how can you be preparing for a job you don't know about yet?

Have you taken a good look around? Are better things coming your way? This session will explore the journey from officer to manager to department head and consider how, within our sector niche, HELOA members can think about exploring that \*next step\* (spoiler, it doesn't always have to be 'up'). Remember, things will be alright in the end.

- Learn how to demonstrate strategic capability in interviews and applications
- Discover practical ways to gain experience in strategy-setting while in a role that might not have that in the JD
- Hear real-life examples of progression journeys and what helped make the transition successful

# Option 2: Thinking strategically and creating a sense of belonging- Ryan Martin-Loughborough University

Working in a university, particularly in recruitment and outreach can be challenging and often you have different voices, from management, marketing and academics throwing conflicting priorities at you.

Can this make you feel detached from the university, its wider strategy and goals? This session will cover how to manage those expectations, consider how wider university strategy ties in with our work and targeting, the importance of evaluation, as well as using demonstratable data to seek buy in.

We will also discuss how to use this to your advantage when considering progression or future roles.

#### What you will learn:

- Learn how wider university strategy can tie in to recruitment and outreach work, creating a better sense of belonging
- Increased awareness of the importance of evaluation moving forward
- Understand how past experience and belonging can be demonstratable evidence moving forward
