## Outside cubicle

Signage reads WC, Toilet or has a picture of a loo\*

Open plan entry no narrow external atrium

No gaps at top and bottom of doors/walls



## Inside cubicle

Sink, to wash hands before touching handles

Mirror, to adjust veil, wig, etc

Bin for sanitary products

- ♥ Wording: All gender, inclusive or unisex. Accessible if relevant. You may want to indicate which toilets contain urinals and sanitary bins.
- Pictures: Traditional man/woman signs are falling out of favour because they are so stereotyped. The half man, half woman to represent non-binary people is seen as problematic, particularly if shown with a man and woman rather than on its own to represent an amalgam of people.
- Particularly problematic: Whatever/whichever signs, especially if they have non-humans on, as they can come across dismissive and dehumanizing.
- Consult disabled people on disability signage (e.g. a wheelchair doesn't convey hidden disability well). Do not just make accessible toilets allgender, increasing demand and making disabled people have to queue.
